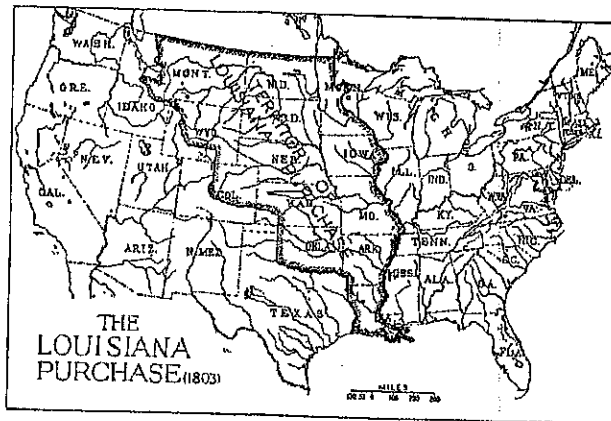

The Louisiana Purchase



The United States wasn't always as big as it is now. It used to stop at the Mississippi River. Now it reaches from the Atlantic Ocean to the Pacific Ocean.

We can thank Thomas Jefferson for that. He was our third president. As president, he decided to buy some land from another country.

- 3 Today we call that land the Louisiana Purchase. It made the U.S. twice as large as it was before.

Getting the land wasn't easy. Some people thought the president shouldn't buy it. The president wasn't sure either. Finally the government decided it was right.

Now the U.S. had a lot of land. The president chose two men to explore it.

Mr. Lewis and Mr. Clark were the ones chosen to go. They took a team with them. This team included an American Indian guide. She helped the team talk with American Indian people.

- 7 The explorers met many American Indian groups along the way. These people gave the team food and guides to help them. Without their help, the team may not have lived.

Lewis and Clark traveled nearly 8,000 miles. As he traveled, Lewis wrote notes in a journal. He wrote about the animals, plants, and weather he saw along the way. He also made maps of the area so others could go there later.



Lewis and Clark wanted most of all to find a waterway to the Pacific Ocean. This would make trade and travel easier. They never found one.

After more than a year of travel by land, the team reached the Pacific Ocean. They split up on the way back to cover more water routes. They met again before returning home and shared what they had learned about other rivers and lakes.

At the end of the trip, Lewis and Clark met with the president. He gave them rewards for their work. Some rewards were gifts of land and jobs.

After that, lots of people from the East moved to the new land. You live there now. Arkansas is one of the states that were made from the Louisiana Purchase.

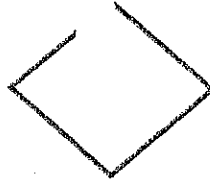

The White House



Have you ever seen a picture of the White House? Most people in the United States have seen the White House in photos or on TV. In fact, many people all around the world know what the White House looks like. Why? It's because the White House is a symbol of our country. It is the home of the President of the United States. It is also the place where the President works. When people see the White House, they think of the President who lives there.

The President's Home

George Washington, our first president, planned the building of the White House, but he never got to live in it. The first President to live there was John Adams. He and his wife moved into the house in 1800. Since then, the building has grown and changed many times. The White House now has a swimming pool. It has a place to play tennis. It has a bowling lane. It even has a movie theater. John Adams would be amazed if he could visit the White House today!

The White House is not just a home. It is also a workplace. The President's office is in a part of the building called the West Wing. The office is not shaped like a box like most rooms. It is built in an oval shape, like an egg. In fact, it is called the Oval Office. It has three large windows. These windows are behind the President's desk. The President works and holds meetings in the Oval Office. The West Wing has many other offices, but none of them are oval-shaped!

The Nation's Home

The White House is not just a home and office. It receives many visitors every year. Leaders of other countries come to speak with the President at the White House. Leaders of our own government often meet and work at the White House. People from TV and radio stations come to the White House to learn about news stories. They speak with the President in a special room called the Press Room. All these people help our government work.

You can be a visitor to the White House too. The White House is open for all people to visit. You can see the rooms where presidents have lived and worked. You can learn all about the building.

In years to come, more presidents and their families will live in the White House. More changes will be made to the building, but the White House will always stand as a symbol of our country.

White House Facts

- The White House is over 200 years old. It has been home to 42 presidents and their families.
- It has also been home to many pets, including cats, dogs, goats, and even a pony.
- It has 132 rooms, 35 bathrooms, and 6 floors. There are also 412 doors, 147 windows, 28 fireplaces, 8 staircases, and 3 elevators.
- There are five full-time cooks, and the White House kitchen can serve dinner to 140 people at once.

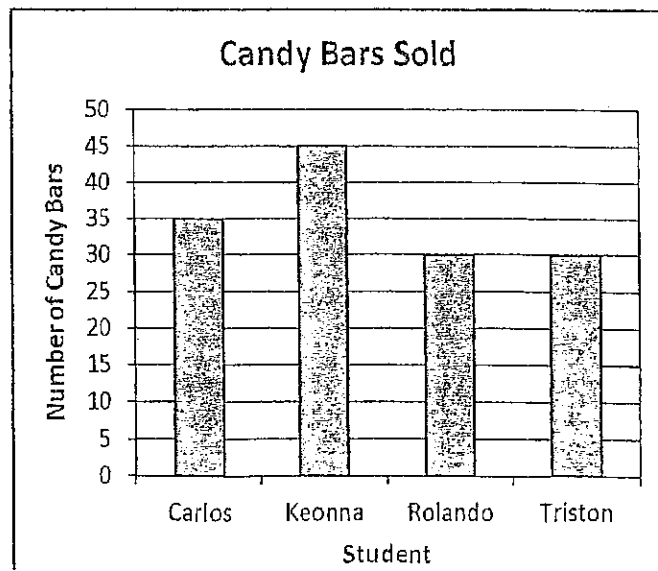

No, it's not the name of a new special on TV, in between "When Hippos Attack" and "When Good Tornadoes Go Bad." It's when you're out playing and you suddenly feel a rumbling in your stomach. It's past lunch but not yet time for dinner—just the right time for a snack!

Snack attacks are normal for kids, who need lots of energy from food to keep them going all day long. But when your snack attacks strike, do you know why? What are the best things to eat to get rid of your hunger and give your body great nutrients?

In the Mood for Food

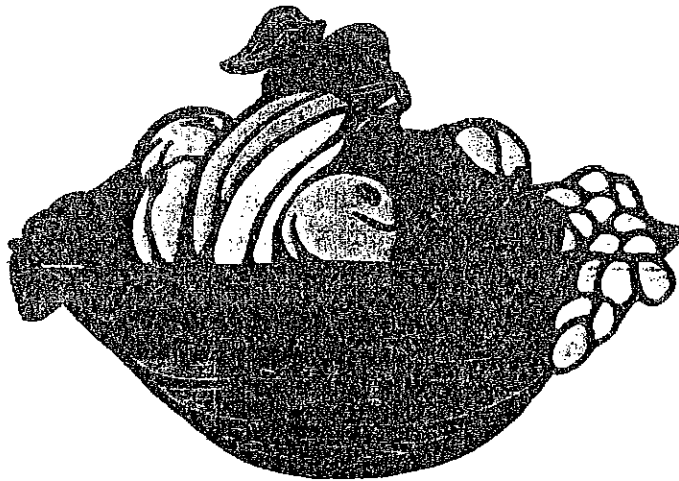
You gobbled your cereal at breakfast and felt full when you went to school. But now, after working on your art project,

running around in gym class, and reading out loud, you're ready to eat again! That's because your body has used up the energy from your cereal. It needs more "fuel" to keep you going until lunchtime.

Kids need to refuel their bodies many times during the day because they need a ton of energy for all the things they do. Swimming, walking, carrying your backpack, even playing on the computer, all

require energy. Kids also have small stomachs which need to be filled up frequently! That's where snacks come in: they give you a little fuel to keep you from getting too tired and hungry. Eating snacks keeps your brain and body moving.

A good snacking guideline is to eat a meal or snack every 3 or 4 hours. Keep

some snacks like granola bars or a banana in your backpack, so when snack attacks strike you can get rid of your hunger.

The Facts on Healthy Snacks

Do you think snacking means crunching chips, munching marshmallows, or chowing down on cookies? If you do, you're not alone. Some people think snacking is bad because they think of junk food when they think of snacks.

So should junk food be your snack? No way! Healthy snacks are packed with nutrients that your body needs to grow strong and stay well. Need an example? An orange will give you quick energy now and vitamin C for later. A pile of potato chips contains lots of fat, something that most kids don't need a lot of. If you want to keep tabs on the fat and nutrients in your food, you can check out the nutrition facts label or food label.

8 Does this mean that you can never sink your teeth into a sweet or salty snack that you love? Of course not! It's OK to eat junk food in moderation (this means only every so often and not much of the food at once). Just remember that most of your snacks shouldn't be junk food. For snacks that are healthy and tasty, read on for some snack ideas.

Echoes Guide the Way

- 1 Can you find your way around with your eyes closed? How do you do it? Dolphins do it by using their ears. Dolphins use echolocation (say eh-ko-lo-kay-shun). Echolocation lets them see things by listening for their echoes.

You hear an echo when you walk into a big, empty room like a gym. You may hear the sound of your own footsteps repeated. If you say something, it sounds like someone is repeating what you said. Dolphins are mammals that live in water. They can hear echoes too. Dolphins swim quickly through the water to hunt for their food. They can't always see in deep, dark water, so echolocation helps them hunt.



- 3 Dolphins make sounds called clicks. The clicks go through the top of the dolphin's head. This part of a dolphin's body is called the melon. It is filled with fat. The clicks make sound waves. The melon pushes the sound waves into the water in front of the dolphin. The fat helps them send sound waves.

Sound waves move quickly through water. Sound can move through water much faster than it can through air. Sound moves four and a half times faster through water. When the sound waves hit something, they bounce back to the dolphin. The dolphin hears an echo.

Bones that are low on the dolphin's head get the sounds from the echo. The sound moves to the dolphin's middle ear. Then it moves deeper inside the ear and to the brain. The dolphin's brain can understand what the sounds mean. The brain makes a picture of the object.

Dolphins can find the shape and size of an object using echolocation. Dolphins can tell how far away an object is. They wait to see how long the echo takes to return. The echo from a closer object comes back faster. The echo from an object that is far away takes longer to come back.

Using echolocation, dolphins can tell if an object is moving. They can also tell in which direction it is moving. When dolphins hunt, this helps them find fish they want to eat. Different fish make different echoes. Dolphins know different fish by their echoes.

- 8 A dolphin's echolocation is very exact. A dolphin can tell a golf ball from a ping-pong ball. The balls look alike, but the golf ball is heavier. The dolphin can tell this by the ball's echo. Dolphins use echolocation to

find things far away. A sound can travel as far as two football fields away, and a dolphin will be able to hear it. Dolphins can easily find objects that are 2 to 6 inches long.

Dolphins use echolocation in dark water where they cannot see. They use echolocation to hunt, to find their way in the dark, and even to communicate with each other.

This passage is about bees. After you read to find out some facts about bees, circle the answer to multiple-choice questions 1 through 8 and answer the open-response question.

What Do Bees Do?

Have you ever watched a honeybee fly from flower to flower? It might look like the bee is just flying around, but the honeybee is actually hard at work. You could say it is “as busy as a bee”!

Honeybees spend a lot of time looking for food. They look in flowers for nectar and pollen. Nectar is a sweet liquid, and pollen is a powder. They are both food for bees. Honeybees carry the nectar and pollen home with them, where they share the food with the other honeybees.

- 3 Honeybees live in homes called hives. Many honeybees build their hives in large holes in trees. Honeybees make their hives out of a special wax that comes from their bodies.

Thousands of honeybees live and work together in a hive. There are three kinds of bees living in the hive: a queen bee, drones, and worker bees. The queen and workers are female bees, and the drones are male bees. Each kind of bee has a different job to do.

- 5 There is only one queen bee in a hive. She is larger than the other bees, and her job is very important. She lays all the eggs for her hive. One queen bee can lay more than a thousand eggs a day! Young bees will hatch from these eggs and later grow into adults.



Worker bees do all the other jobs in the hive. They make and clean the hive. They guard the hive. They take care of the queen. They fly away from the hive to find pollen and nectar. They make the pollen into a special food for the young bees to eat. They make the nectar into honey for the adult bees to eat.

People eat honey, too. Some people keep bees and collect the honey to sell. They wear special clothes to protect themselves from bee stings.

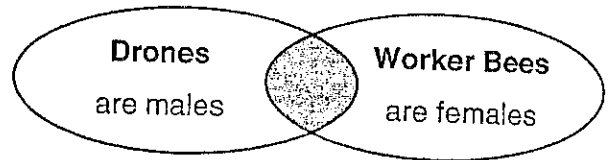
Sometimes a group of bees leaves the hive to start a new hive. This usually happens when a new queen is born inside the hive. Then the older queen leaves the hive with many of the worker bees and drones. The bees may cluster around a tree branch while some of the worker bees look around for a place to build their new hive. When the worker bees find a good spot, the bees all travel together to make a new hive.

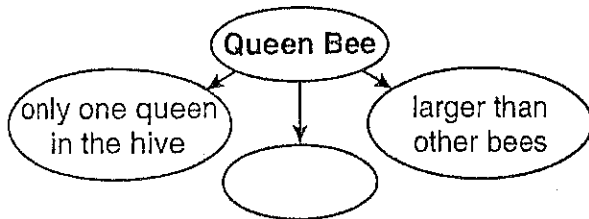
